Allergies:

- ☐ Our school is “nut aware.” Please refrain from sending peanut butter/nuts to school.

Lockers:

- ☐ The school is not responsible for stolen or lost items.

School Computers/iPads:

- ☐ iPads are the property of DSB1
- ☐ iPads are to be used for educational purposes. Students are responsible for the content on the iPad.
- ☐ Passwords should be changed and not shared.
- ☐ iPads are restricted to school use only.
- ☐ Students will be responsible for damage to their iPad case or iPad.
- ☐ For students bringing their DSB1 iPad home, they are responsible for returning it to school each day, fully charged.

Visitors:

Skateboards, Bikes, Scooters:

- ☐ Students are not permitted to ride skateboards, bikes or scooters on school property.
- ☐ Bikes can be stored and locked in the bike racks at the front of the school

STUDENT EXPECTATIONS IN RELATION TO THE CODE OF CONDUCT (PROCEDURE 2.1.6)

Appropriate Dress:

Students are expected to dress in a manner appropriate to the school environment, compliant with the individual school's dress code. Students are expected to dress appropriately for classroom work.

- *Inappropriate dress includes any clothing or personal possession that has representations and/or language that depict violence, profanity, discriminatory, hateful, or sexually explicit images or sentiments. In addition, dress or logos that demean or threaten an identifiable individual or group are prohibited.*

Respect for Authority:

Students are expected to comply with the rules of the school and with the expectations of school personnel. The rules which have been established under the Education Act, are not intended to be difficult for students to follow. They are grounded in respect for self and for others and have been endorsed by your teachers, your parents, and your peers. All staff and students deserve the right to be free from verbal and physical abuse.

- *We support a hands-off policy by respecting each other's personal space.*
- *Swearing and offensive language are not acceptable within the school.*

Conduct Off School Property:

Behaviour off school property and outside of the school day can negatively affect the learning environment and student safety in the school. Were there is evidence of this, the school principal will intervene as if the inappropriate behaviour was initiated in the school setting.

- *Students who choose to engage in harming another student*
- *through physical and/or verbal violence, in person or online,*
- *will be dealt with accordingly and may face possible suspension/expulsion/police involvement.*

Bus Regulations:

Students are expected to comply with the school bus rules which are designed to ensure the safety of all students travelling to and from school. Inappropriate behaviour on the school bus may result in loss of bus privileges, as per the Transport EnRoute policy and your school discipline procedures.

Transportation for Field Trips:

If student behaviour on a school field is inappropriate, families will be notified and the student will be sent home. Families will be responsible for the return transportation costs. Further consequences are possible, pending investigation.

Respect for Property:

Students are expected to treat all school property with respect at all times. Students who destroy, deface or lose school property may be required to pay the cost of repair or replacement. At the discretion of the principal other measures may be taken.

- *Desks and lockers are school property. Writing on either is vandalism and is not tolerated.*

Punctuality and Attendance:

Students are expected to attend and be on time for all of their classes and school activities in order to be successful. Families and students should be aware of school protocols, and the Safe Arrival Policy [[Safe Arrival \(Procedure No. 2.1.2\)](#)].

- *Parents/Guardians must report all student absences through Safe Arrival, by telephone, or by email before 8:55 a.m. on the morning of the absence. Please note that the telephone lines are quite busy during the day and someone may not answer your call. Do not hesitate to leave a message since they are checked regularly. You can also email the school at rrbps@dsb1.ca*
- *Students who arrive late (after 8:55 a.m.) **must sign in at the office** in the binder at the desk prior to entering class. Persistent lateness will require students to meet with school administrators.*
- *Students who are being signed out, are to leave the building and not remain on school property. This includes during special activity days being hosted at R. Ross Beattie Public School.*

Lunch:

Students may leave school property for lunch with parent/guardian permission.

Permission must be given by note, email or phone call before 11:00am.

Parents/Guardians can give their child permission to leave at lunch for the entire school year or for a day at a time. Students must sign out at the office before leaving for lunch and return by 12:25pm. Once a student leaves for lunch, they cannot come back onto school property until 12:25pm.

Drinks at School:

To help maintain a safe and focused learning environment, outside drinks such as coffee, hot chocolate, energy drinks, and slushies are not permitted in the school or classroom. These drinks must be finished and disposed of before entering the school. Water bottles containing water can be brought to class.

Preparation for Classes:

Students are expected to prepare for each class; to have the materials necessary in order to ensure success in academic studies.

Smoking and Vaping:

Smoking and/or vaping is not permitted anywhere on school property as per the City of Timmins By-Law No 2011-7123 [[City of Timmins - Document Center \(civicweb.net\)](#)] as well as the Smoke Free Ontario Act [[O. Reg. 268/18: GENERAL \(ontario.ca\)](#)] and [Substance Abuse and Related Behaviour \(Procedure No. 2.1.13\)](#).

- *Cigarettes, vaporizers, and lighters/matches are **NOT** to be visible or used in the school or on school field trips. If cigarettes and vapes are visible in the school or on school property, students will face progressive discipline (i.e., if a student is holding a vape in the washroom, it will be assumed that they are vaping and will face consequences). As discussed in [Policy/Program Memorandum 128](#), if a student is in possession of an electronic cigarette, tobacco or nicotine product at school, it will be surrendered and disposed of, and families will be immediately informed.*

Personal Mobile Devices:

Students are expected to comply with the restrictions set out for personal mobile devices [[Student Personal Mobile Device \(Procedure 2.1.43\)](#)]. Such devices are not permitted during instructional time unless it is for educational purposes as directed by an educator, for health and medical purposes, or to support special education needs [[Policy/Program Memorandum 128](#)].

- *DSB1 is proud to offer 1:1 iPads for students in Grades 4 to 12 to support learning. As such, personal devices are not required and will not be permitted for learning purposes in our schools.*
- *School administration reserve the right to ask that cellphones be kept in a safe location at the office if the situation continues to occur.*
- *Exceptions will be made for students with a known medical condition, where a personal mobile device is required to support, monitor or regulate their health or medical condition, as indicated by a healthcare professional.*
- *Under no circumstances are cellphones to be used in areas including washrooms or changerooms or used to violate the privacy of others. Under no circumstances should photos, videos or recordings of any kind be taken of others without their expressed consent.*
- *Students can check their devices before school, during the lunch period and after school.*
- *If you need to reach your child during class time, please contact the office.*

Academic Honesty:

Students are expected to follow the [Growing Success Policy \(Procedure 2.1.34\)](#) at all times. Consequences for plagiarism or cheating will be determined following the Growing Success Policy.

- *When a student plagiarizes or cheats, the student does not provide evidence of achievement. Based on the consideration of mitigating factors, teachers and/or administrators will choose from a variety of possible responses. Some resolutions include assigning a zero and/or the opportunity to complete a similar evaluation.*
- *We are committed to the responsible and ethical use of Artificial Intelligence to enhance how we work and learn. To guide our community, we have established clear frameworks for navigating these emerging tools. Please review the [AI Guidelines for Students](#).*

MENTAL HEALTH & WELL-BEING AT BEATTIE

When we talk about mental health, some people think about serious mental illnesses and disorders like schizophrenia or bipolar disorder. But we all should strive for mental health, a positive sense of emotional and spiritual well-being.

Mental well-being encourages individuals to explore, take healthy risks, overcome adversity, and contribute to the world around them. At Beattie, we believe that mental health is more than just the absence of illness. Well-being can be enhanced and nurtured through positive mental health promotion and prevention. Schools are excellent places to build the skills, attitudes, knowledge, and habits that support mental well-being for ALL students and staff.

Any parent or student above the age of 12 with concerns in regards to mental health, who would like to access these services is encouraged to speak to a teacher or school administration about the referral process.

Key roles include:

- Promote wellness and help students build skills for resiliency through social-emotional learning.
- Facilitate student learning on mental health and well-being.
- Help students develop strong coping and stress management strategies.
- Provide classroom and small group support with common mental health problems such as anxiety.
- Notice when students may be struggling with mental health issues or concerns.
- Support early assessment and prevention
- Provide early intervention services
